

Safeguarding New York's production of fruits and vegetables through research.

Last summer at Cornell AgriTech in Geneva. biology major Alvin Randall helped discover the location on an apple's chromosome of any natural resistance to fire blight. In appleproducing regions like Upstate New York, fire blight can decimate an entire crop of apples.

Relying on his previous course and lab work at HWS, Alvin had a strong foundation in analyzing collected data and understanding protein nomenclature. The results of his research will help growers select apple varieties that can stand up to the bacteria that causes fire blight.

Alvin's research opportunity at Cornell's School of Integrative Plant Science was made possible through the Salisbury Center. "The team made me feel really welcomed and created a great environment that encouraged me to ask questions and learn new techniques."
