Since we couldn't be together physically, I really wanted to help ensure that the seniors would be recognized and celebrated in some of the ways that we would be if we were on campus.

Even though my senior year turned out to be very different than I thought it would be, I want to let you know how grateful I am for Oberlin—and for Oberlin's amazing alumni community. The best thing about Oberlin is the people. I know that many of you have donated your time, your resources, and your money to help me and other students succeed.
