#### WHY A NEW MACHINE?

While our current machine has provided exceptional radiation treatment to thousands of animals, we need to replace it now to provide even more accurate and safer treatment to our animal patients. With the new machine, radiation can be better directed to the tumor, while protecting surrounding healthy tissues. And because the dose rate can be moderated, it reduces treatment time for animals with cancer.

Today as we look to the future of patient care, a new linear accelerator, or LINAC, which delivers radiation therapy to cancer patients, cannot wait.
